Today, we cast a wide net of support that reaches 4,000 children and families every year, and our programs are designed to transform lives. Our board and staff share an unwavering passion to make a difference. They are true leaders with an unstoppable drive to overcome obstacles, working together each and every day so that all children—no matter their financial situation, ethnicity, gender, or race—can reach their full potential.




### **2020 FINANCIAL OVERVIEW**


For Budget Year January 1 - December 31

## **COVID-19 Response**

When it became clear that COVID-19 was not a fleeting moment, CCF knew we had to quickly change the way we thought about service delivery. We couldn't just shut our doors. We couldn't let this community down, not when it needed us most.

Our basic needs support requests jumped fivefold. We had to act quickly. We initiated grab 'n go service at our weekly Food Pantry. We launched a new food delivery program for seniors, the disabled, single-parent households, and frontline workers. Thanks to our generous friends and funders, including The Rhode Island Foundation, United Way of Rhode Island, BankRI, June Rockwell Levy Foundation, and Rocco Baldelli Hunt, we were able to purchase more food and other essentials for distribution.

CCF was the only site in Rhode Island to continue its Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program (VITA), which provides free tax return preparation for eligible families. Though sadly we could not sit face to face with clients, we were able to keep our services as client-friendly as possible, while following all safety protocols. As a result, we were able to generate roughly \$2 million in much-needed tax returns.

Even as unemployment skyrocketed nationwide, CCF continued empowering adults to enter the workforce. Our Northern RI Career Academy was just beginning a new cohort of job seekers when the pandemic struck. The swiftness with which our staff switched to distance learning—securing funding to purchase laptops and internet capability for participants—was amazing: we did not lose a single participant, and in fact, the cohort was able to graduate on time.

While our Parents as Teachers home visiting program, afterschool enrichment, and summer camps transitioned to virtual platforms, we happily welcomed our toddlers and preschoolers back to a newly safeguarded Hope Street Early Learning Center in June, just 2½ months after the Governor had closed all childcare providers.

From June through December 2020, CCF continued to innovate, to serve, and to stay as connected as we possibly could to our children and families. We thank the generous funders who made our agility possible.

# SERVICES SPOTLIGHT: WOONSOCKET HIGH SCHOOL WANT A JOB? PROGRAM

CCF puts great emphasis on programs that help prepare youth for their futures. Our *Want A Job?* academic and social enrichment afterschool program provides career exploration and work readiness training for Woonsocket High School students.

In partnership with the RI Governor's Workforce Board, CCF offers the eight-week *Want A Job?* program in the fall, winter, and spring.

The career exploration element of *Want A Job?* brings in guest speakers from a variety of fields to talk about their careers and the pathways they have followed to achieve success.

Work readiness training hones a variety of essential skills, including: financial literacy; resume, cover, and thank-you letter writing; and interviewing do's and don'ts.

Want A Job? also connects students with other CCF programs they can utilize well into adulthood, like SuccessWear, which provides free professional apparel for jobseekers.

Want A Job? students receive a \$100 stipend for attending regularly, completing a resume and cover letter, and making a final presentation.

Want A Job? has become hugely popular with students, teachers, and CCF staff. **Students** build useful and relevant skills as they think about their futures and prepare to enter the workforce with confidence. **Teachers** appreciate the consistent improvement in participating student attendance and behavior. And **CCF staff**? We so enjoy working with the Want A Job? high school students who apply for summer jobs with us and help CCF campers build critical literacy and math skills!



### Happiness for the Holidays

The Holidays can be such a happy time. They can also be stressful, as we try to get perfect presents purchased and wrapped, special meals prepared, and family activities organized. Winter 2020 was an especially challenging time, with the pandemic keeping families and friends from gathering. COVID-related financial hardship just added to the stress.

We are grateful to CCF community members who helped us deliver holiday cheer to our children and families. Thanks to the generosity of BankRI, Landmark Medical Center, Navigant Credit Union, and the First Baptist Church of East Greenwich, we were able to provide toys, clothing, and other presents for children to open and enjoy.

Community generosity enabled us to expand our annual Giving Tree to include 100 families!
